Annual Report 2023

Rowan County prides itself on “being an original”. An individual who is “original” can be said to be authentic, genuine, and nonconformist.

The Rowan Economic Development Council has worked for years to develop the infrastructure for growth, and now that growth is arriving. We could not be prouder to celebrate Macy’s, Inc.’s selection of Rowan County for its new distribution center, along with its significant investment of 2,800 new jobs and \$584.3 million in capital. For a company as iconic as Macy’s to choose to bring nearly 30% of its digital supply chain capacity to China Grove speaks volumes to all the assets Rowan has to offer, and we have the EDC to thank for several of those. The challenges faced and goals achieved of 2021 provided Rowan County the chance to prove how “original” it truly is.

2022 was a busy year for the Rowan EDC, with announcements of the expansions of both Eastern Wholesale Fence LLC and Stout Heating and Air Conditioning, Inc. in Salisbury. Eastern Fence announced plans to create 40 new jobs and invest \$10.5 million in equipment and improvements to its facility in the Mid-South Industrial Park at 7401 Statesville Boulevard. Stout Heating and Air will create 14 new jobs and invest \$2.9 million to acquire and expand an existing facility at 205 Cedar Springs Road in Salisbury.

Average wages in Rowan County exceeded \$50,000 for the first time ever. This is the fourth highest average wage in the metro region and 14th highest in the state of North Carolina. Our labor force grew to 67,795 persons, the highest it has been since December 2009 but still below the high of 71,721 in 2007.

With all of these “firsts” can we say that 2022 was the year in which we reached a tipping point from which there is no going back? I think it is safe to say that our “wave” will continue to build momentum for many years to come, but it is also not a time to rest on our laurels.





HOW TO CALCULATE TAXES

The 2022 tax rate for Rowan County is 0.6575.

This means property will be taxed at 0.6575 cents per \$100 of value. As an example, if your home is appraised at \$150,000, here is the formula on how to calculate your bill:

$$\$150,000 / 100 \times 0.6575 = \$986.25$$



RECENT GROWTH

In 2022 Macy's, the iconic retail brand, chose Rowan County as ground zero for its strategy to modernize for future growth. In announcing its new 1.4 million SF distribution facility, with 2800 new jobs and an investment of over a half billion dollars, it became the largest new project announcement in Rowan County history. Average wages in Rowan County exceeded \$50,000 for the first time ever. This is the fourth highest average wage in the metro region and 14th highest in the state of North Carolina.

TALENT ATTRACTION

Interest in relocating or expanding to Rowan County businesses as measured by the number of leads we received was the highest in history and there were 13 companies that visited a total of 22 times. The new buildings coming into our market will generate demand for up to 30,000 new employees, and we prepared for it by launching a talent attraction campaign to gain a larger share of the more than 110 people who move to the region each day. Our focus is shifting from business attraction to talent attraction. and representing a real need

FOOD PROCESSING DESTINATION

Business Facilities magazine ranked Rowan County among the top 10 metro areas in North America for food processing for the second year in a row, earning the No. 8 spot in 2022. This is due to Rowan's many assets, including its strong water supply from the Yadkin River and the North Carolina Food Innovation Lab in Kannapolis. Rowan is also home to major companies like Food Lion and Cheerwine, as well as local producers like Carolina Malt House and Patterson Farm, providing a robust supply chain for new businesses.



PRODUCTIVE DEVELOPMENT

The Charlotte Business Journal's (CBJ) editorial staff compiled their list of the region's top 25 stories of 2022 and Rowan

County made the number 16 spot with the announcement of the Macy's project coming to China Grove. The story titled, "Macy's commits to \$584 million distribution complex in Rowan County" was released on December 20 and calls Rowan County a major beneficiary to the "expansion of Charlotte's industrial real estate market". The Macy's project is the centerpiece of a wave of industrial activity in Rowan County, which is capitalizing on its proximity to a major interstate. Rod Crider, president and CEO of Rowan EDC, told CBJ in October that the county has 23 million square feet of industrial development under construction, in planning or being considered to locate there.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

The Rowan County Board of Commissioners consists of five (5) members who are elected at large in countywide elections to serve four-year staggered terms. The Board's main purpose is to maintain fiscal responsibility while providing mandated services as set out in the General Statutes and for additional services as passed on to the County by state and federal governments. The Board is also responsible for setting policies, goals and objectives to direct the County's growth and development, adopting and providing for ordinances, rules and regulations as necessary for the general welfare of County citizens and other services deemed appropriate and necessary by the Board.

ADMINISTRATION

The Clerk to the Board, County Attorney and County Manager serve at the pleasure of the Board of Commissioners. The County Manager is the chief administrator of county government. He is appointed by the Board of Commissioners and is responsible for the supervision of county operations in accordance with the laws, regulations, policies, direction and guidance the Board of Commissioners authorize. The County Manager, in conjunction with Finance Department staff, is responsible for preparing and submitting the annual budget to the Board, as well as advising the Board on financial matters, services and other issues.

The Clerk to the Board is responsible for keeping the minutes of the Board of Commissioners and the County Ordinance Books, as well as various other county records.

The County Attorney provides legal expertise and services to county staff and departments, and the Board of Commissioners.

It is the policy of NC Department of Health and Human Services to provide services, care, benefits, and assistance to all qualified persons without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, or political beliefs.

STEPS TO BECOMING A FOSTER PARENT

1. Be between the ages of 21 to 65 years old, married or single.
2. Have adequate income to meet your family's financial needs.
3. Have a clear criminal background check, with no prior history of Child Protective Services involvement.
4. Pass a home inspection by the County Fire Marshal and DSS social worker.
5. Pass a physical exam from your physician along with a TB test.
6. Complete TIPS-MAPP (Trauma Informed Partnering for Safety and Permanence-Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting.)

Rowan County DSS is responsible for receiving and screening reports of child abuse and neglect, as well as reports of abuse, neglect, and/or exploitation of adults who are disabled. If a child protective services report meets the statutory definitions for abuse, neglect, or dependency, the report is assigned to a social worker for assessment. Findings determine what services are recommended or required, including possible court action.

If an adult protective services report meets the definitions set forth in law and policy, the report is assigned to a social worker for evaluation. Findings determine whether or not the Department will recommend services or seek court action. Adults who are determined to have the capacity to make their own decisions may elect to stay in situations in which they are abused, neglected, or exploited. The social worker collaborates with other service providers in the community to include adult day care, in-home aide, adult care homes, and skilled nursing facilities, to name just a few.

The legal authority to protect adults who are disabled and children is defined in the North Carolina General Statutes. Rowan County DSS is the legal custodian for nearly 200 children and legal guardian for around 70 adults. There are many ways citizens can support the work DSS does with children and families. 

During the **2022-2023** school year, the Rowan-Salisbury School System served **18,067 STUDENTS in 33** public school settings across Rowan County. RSS believes that the FIRST option in education is the BEST option in education for Rowan County families. As the first and only Renewal District in NC, RSS is rewriting the traditional approach to education, finding new ways to include professionals in the learning experience, and providing meaningful and engaging work for students and staff.

Each RSS high school offers an academy option available for all RSS students. The high school academies included Agriculture and Farm-To-Table; Business, Marketing, and Finance; Communications; Health Sciences; Fine and Performing Arts; STEM and Advanced Manufacturing. Students also had the option to enroll in the Rowan County Early College to earn a high school diploma and Associate of Arts degree, Summit Virtual Academy for online at-home learning, Dual Language Immersion at Isenberg Elementary, Competency-Based Education at Morgan Elementary or School Choice for North Rowan High School.

The Rowan-Salisbury Board of Education typically meets on the second and fourth Monday of each month at the Wallace Educational Forum, 500 N. Main St., Salisbury, NC. Work sessions are held every second Monday, and business meetings are held every fourth Monday. Board members are elected by Rowan County citizens in nonpartisan elections every four years. The terms are staggered to ensure continuity of service.
